Caddies . . . Legend and Lore

Being a caddy was an opportunity to pay bills, help parents struggling during the depression and after, raise spending money, and meet people from outside of the neighborhood. Caddying was hard work and it was fun!

We've grown up listening to the stories our friends have told about caddying at the various country clubs in the area. When an ex-caddy tells a story, you can bet it's a story to tell. We hope you join us on Thursday, May 17th, at the Highwood Bocce Club to finally celebrate *Caddies . . . Legend and Lore*. Old friends, great stories and more fun than pitching nickels.

The following are a sample of stories we've collected to date which first appeared in our Spring 2011 Newsletter. Please add to our archive and send your story to highwoodhistory@gmail.com.

Caddy John "joe" Pett—Exmoor, Lake Shore, and Bob O'Link, 1953

Joe Pett's house ran alongside of Exmoor Country Club. He started caddying at Exmoor at the age of 12. In the 1930's a caddy was paid \$1.00 for 18 holes and \$0.25 tip. After a year and if he was able to carry 2 bags he made \$2.50 for 18 holes.

According to Joe, mad loopers were young boys or men who were there all the time. He remembers, in particular, two brothers whose father had died. The boys caddied as much as they could to help support the family. The Caddy Master was

aware of their situation and made sure that they got out as much as possible, even twice a day.

Joe said it was really a melting pot of kids. He remembers a lot of Italian kids who couldn't even speak English sitting in the caddy shed waiting to be called out to caddy. "I think this is where a lot of kids from Highwood learned their love of the game of golf and met the friends they kept a lifetime."

Excerpts from his book "Of Long Ago Caddies and Exmoor's Kings. Of Exmoor Places and Forgotten Things."

IT PAYS TO KNOW SOMEBODY

In 1921 my father's oldest sister arrived at Ellis Island from Italy, where she married Roberto Saielli*, a newly crowned U.S. citizen. Immediately after the ceremony she was allowed to enter the country, boarded a train and three days later was introduced to the newlyweds' one room "appartamento" in a place called Highwood, Illinois. (*Great Uncle of current Exmoor member, Robert Saielli).

A few months later my father, along with his uncle, made the long trip from the hunger and poverty of the Tuscan/Modenese Appenines for the promises of the dirty coal pits of west central Texas. As soon as he arrived in Texas, my aunt began writing; no, she begged my father, Nello, to leave the mines and come to Highwood. She was sure he could find a job at something called "un clobbo di golfo"!

In early April of 1922, taking a few clothes, a new leather wallet containing a few dollars and with lungs already dusted with the fine soot of those mines, my father left his uncle, the barroom philosophers, the Texas tumbleweed and snakes, and took the long 5 day train ride to Highwood.

His new brother-in-law, Roberto Saielli, worked at a place called Old Elm Country Club where, since 1916, the greens keeper was his own brother-in-law, Adelmo Bertucci. Roberto also had a brother who had been working, since 1916, at a place called Exmoor Country Club. My father was in seventh heaven; as soon as he arrived in Highwood he had his choice of a summer job at either Exmoor or Old Elm.

AND SO MY STORY BEGINS

He selected Exmoor and my story begins; for he was to remain employed by Exmoor for the next 47 years! My dad was 22 years old when he started to work on the golf course. Exmoor had celebrated its 25th Silver Anniversary the year before. Forty seven years, non-stop; winter and summer, with no vacation time, until the mid-1960's, when he retired as one of the first employees to receive Exmoor's new pension benefits!

He performed a myriad of tasks including the watering and cutting of fairways, plowing snow and "making" ice for the curling and skating rinks. Exmoor, his family's salvation during the terrible depression years, was his life's work, his church and his America.

As a toddler I often accompanied my father whenever he worked late afternoons and early evenings. I hit my first golf ball off of the second tee (we lived just north of the tee) when I was seven or eight years old. My first Exmoor caddie dollar was earned in 1939 when I was nine years old. There followed hundreds and hundreds of "loops" over the years.

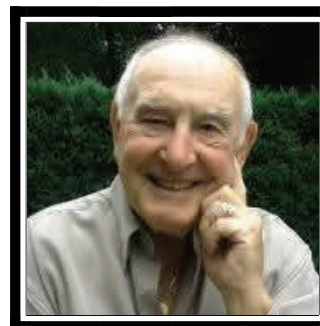
Aldo Crovetti—Exmoor, 1939

First Loop—In the summer of 1939 I began the first of many experiences as a caddy at Exmoor. I started like others as a Class B caddy. I caddied for Mrs. Powers on a Sunday afternoon. For nine holes I made \$0.69. Whoopee! But it was a start.

Amber by Tom Scopelliti

*Here lies a poor woman who always was tired,
For she lived in a world where much was required.
"Weep not for me, friends," she said, "for I'm going
Where there'll be neither washing, nor baking, nor sewing;
Then weep not for me; if death must us sever,
Rejoice that I'm going to do nothing forever."*

The above verse exemplified the life of its author, Martha Everts Holden or, more commonly known by her pen name, "Amber." Her poems, anecdotes and articles graced the Chicago papers in the latter part of the 19th century and were extremely entertaining and popular at the time. She lived on Logan Avenue in Highland Park in a house built by her uncle W. W. Everts, the founder of Highwood. This house is still standing. Many of her stories revolve around her train trips to and from Chicago, (presumably to and from the Highwood station since it was a block or so away) as well as references to Fort Sheridan, nature and the beautiful ravines which graced the area, her daily observations in Chicago, and of course family anecdotes.

Martha was born in Hartford, New York, in 1844 and was the child of Nancy and Rev. Jeremiah Everts. Her father was a very talented Baptist minister who, unfortunately, died when she was young. Martha seemed to be different from most children, preferring to play alone, particularly in the nearby woods, where her playmates were the birds and small animals. Her eyes were a golden hazel color, as was her hair, and for this reason she was given the nickname of "Amber."

At the age of 17 Amber moved to Chicago, where her previously secluded life changed and as some would say her special talents as a writer became apparent. She later traveled with friends to California where she met and married her husband, Albert Holden. Her husband was not successful in business and after two years they returned to the Chicago area. Martha learned telegraphy and got a job with Western Union, and in her spare time wrote for newspapers in order to help her husband in the support of their family. Albert Holden continued to have financial problems and abandoned Martha and their three children, leaving Martha to care for her children and also later her invalid mother, no small task for a woman during that time period.

In 1892, after working for the Chicago Journal and the Recorder's Office, she devoted her time chiefly to the Chicago Herald where her articles received the most attention. Amber was a free spirit and led an unconventional life, as did the many artists, musicians, and writers of that era. These like-minded individuals with this "Bohemian" lifestyle formed their own club,

"The Bohemian Club" and met once a week on the 3rd floor of the Shiller Building in Chicago. Amber was the head of this club and was known as the "Queen of Bohemia". A long table stretched down the club's meeting room with a coffee urn on one end and a keg of beer on the other. Amber provided the meals and entertainment for this lively club. She often brought in struggling actors, writers and others in the arts to meet similar minded people of all different levels of success. Some of these would later become famous, such as Isadora Duncan, the famous dancer, and Grace Duffie Boylan, who wrote children's books, as well as the musician/composer Carrie Jacobs Bond. Regulars at the club were such Chicago notables as Opie Reed, Eugene Field, Ben King, and one person with whom Amber was particularly close, William W. Denslow.

Amber's health began to fail and in 1896, Martha Everts Holden died at the age of 52 following an operation at St. Luke's Hospital. Gone was the lady with the sympathetic heart who had worked so hard, conquered so many barriers, helped so many people, and brought cheer and delight to thousands. Gone also were the anecdotes of the Fort Sheridan and Highwood area.

Soon after her death, William W. Denslow married Amber's oldest daughter, Ann, who followed in her mother's footsteps and began writing columns under the pen name of "Ann Waters". After the marriage, William and Ann rented a house in Highwood for \$25.00 a month, before moving to Highland Park. If the name William W. Denslow doesn't ring a bell, you might have heard of the book that he illustrated: *The Wizard of Oz*.
